<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Person with a substance use disorder • Person with addiction • Person who uses drugs • Person who misuses alcohol/engages in unhealthy/hazardous alcohol use • Person's name 	Addict, user, drug abuser, junkie, crackhead, tweaker, pill-popper, alcoholic, drunk
For alcohol: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Risky or unhealthy alcohol use For prescription medications: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Misuse, used other than prescribed For illicit drugs: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use 	Abuse
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Medication for addiction treatment (MAT) • Treatment • Medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) • Opioid agonist therapy (OAT) • Medication for a substance use disorder 	Medication-assisted treatment (MAT), replacement or substitution therapy
For toxicology results: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Positive test • Unexpected result Non-test related: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Person who uses drugs 	Dirty
For toxicology results: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Negative test • Expected result Non-test related: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Person in remission or recovery • Person abstinent from alcohol or drugs • Person not drinking or taking drugs • Person not currently or actively using drugs or alcohol 	Clean
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Baby born with Neonatal Opioid Withdrawal or Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome • Newborn exposed to substances 	Addicted baby, Crack baby
